One more time with feeling

When your child has sounded out an unfamiliar word, have him or her re-read that sentence. Often kids are busy figuring out a word they lose the meaning of what they've just read.

Students:

Notice the relationship in certain words. For example, if you see a word like "knowledge" look up the definition of "know" and "knowledge." Write about how they have similar meanings. Keep a journal of your work.

Throughout the years, history has seen **some fiercely intelligent**, powerful and **inspirational women** who have been pioneers for women's rights and racial equality and have defined the worlds of science, mathematics, aviation and literature. Their



contributions have opened the doors for women all over the world. Whether **these famous females** were inventors, scientists, leaders, politicians, or literal Queens, they undeniably changed the world for the better. They encourage our young girls to aim high and never allow their gender to deter them from climbing higher in life and achieving whatever goals that they set their minds to. Listed below are a two women who are remembered for **being the rule-breakers** and pioneers that showed their male peers what it means to be role models:

<u>Jane Austen</u> – Author, during an era when women weren't allowed to be published.

"The person, be it gentleman or lady, who has not pleasure in a good novel, must be intolerably stupid."

Her novels are funny, endearing, and questioned women's roles within society. Austen had to hide her identity as the author of some of the **most popular novels** of her day and it wasn't until her death that her brother, Henry, revealed to the public that she was the real author. Her literary influence remains and the **themes and lessons** from her novels still hold up today.

Maya Angelou – Poet, Singer, Civil Rights' Activist, Survivalist

"I've learned that people will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel."


Angelou had a difficult childhood. As a black woman growing up in Stamps, Arkansas, Maya experienced <u>racial prejudices and discrimination</u> all throughout her life. At the age of seven, Angelou was assaulted by her mother's boyfriend, who was then killed by her uncles as revenge. The incident traumatized Angelou to the point that she became a virtual mute for many years.
