Accelerated Reader





Accelerated Reader is an online program in which students can take tests on books they have read. All Estill Elementary students have log-in information (a User Name and Password) that was sent home in August and distributed during Technology Night, September 24, 2019. If you need this information or troubleshooting assistance, please see Ms. B. Cohen (Reading Coach) or your child's ELA: Reading teacher. Students are able to access Accelerated Reader at home and school. Our goal is for students to read books on a daily basis (20 minutes at school plus 20 minutes at home), then to take tests AND pass them! So before taking a test at home, please ensure that your child: reads the book more than once, draws/writes a response about what they have read, and answers questions orally about the story. If you do not have online computer access at home, you may send the book to school with your child for them to take an AR test. Children are encouraged to refer back to the text while answering test questions.


